Informational Agenda Items

P. 064 **County Certification of Compliance:** Commission to review and discuss ASD-035 County Certification of Compliance Fiscal Year 2024-2025 Funding

Ms. Ravelo reported that local commissions are required to submit the ASD-035 County Certification of Compliance every year by July 1st to continue receiving Proposition 10 tax revenue. Commission staff is prepared to submit the required certification form and the documentation, attesting that the Commission has met all components of the Certification. Staff also thanked the Commission for their continued dedication and commitment to serving the Commission and ensuring there's a quorum to conduct Commission business.

No comments.

P.068 **Regional Central Valley Help Me Grow status update:** Commission to review and discuss staff update on Regional Central Valley Help Me Grow.

Ms. Ravelo provided an update on the partnering with the Regional Central Valley Help Me Grow project. The discussion has resulted with a contracted consultant to help further the discussion and to develop an action plan to put the regional collaboration into motion. First 5 Merced, First 5 Fresno, First 5 Kings and First 5 Madera, in partnership with Children's Hospital are continuing the discussion to support this project. The proposed share of First 5 Kings is approximately \$20,000 per year with continued exploration of partners to support these endeavors such as the Medi-cal Managed Care Plans.

Comments: Dr. Milton Teske inquired about when they are proposing screenings for children, would it be for an earlier age and who they are proposing to.

Ms. Ravelo indicated that the screenings would be for the 0-5 population, and they are currently looking to partner with pediatricians, and to conduct outreach and different events.

P. 088 **3**rd **Quarter Grantee Achievement Report:** Commission to review and discuss the progress of funded projects for FY 23/24.

Ms. Ravelo presented the 3rd quarter grantee achievement report for discussion and review by the Commission. The 1st page of the report is an overall summary of each programs' progress. There was an error in the calculation of the Hanford FRC which should be 68%. Commission staff will continue to provide technical assistance to help grantees meet their scope of work. However, there are circumstances outside of their control such as lack of permanent site for Avenal for UCP's programming, low enrollment in classes at the Hanford and Lemoore Family Connection sites or families unable to meet with their home visitor in Kettleman City.

Comments: Debbie shared with the group that the eligibility for the Special Needs programs has changed earlier in the year to allow more children to qualify for CVRC, resulting in fewer children staying in their program.

Commissioner Osikafo commented that maybe this could be an opportunity for some bridge program to avoid long wait lists for regional centers. Debbie indicated that this may be something to approach CVRC with.

P. 112 **Spotlight on Service:** Staff from Kings United Way will present an overview of the funded projects, Get Connected!

Kings United Way presentation summary: 211 Database Specialist Alma Mora & 211 Coordinator Yvette Moreno presented a summary of the Get Connected project. They relayed that all individuals that call 211 are asked if they have any children 0-5, and if they say they do, they are offered the opportunity to receive additional information about services for their child. They have been promoting the project at Community Events and developed a 1-page flyer that describes FRC services and the address and contact number for the FRCs. Families are provided with referrals and linkages to other service providers, diapers, food boxes and other information requested.

No comments noted.

P. 169 **Staff Report:** April-May 2024

Program Officer Ravelo provided a summary of projects Commission staff have been working on listed on page 123 of the agenda packet. Some of the projects include transitioning oversight of the CalWORKS/CAPCC Home Visitation contract to another program manager within Public Health starting June 10th. However, Ms. Ravelo will continue to assist with the transition. Ms. Ravelo shared about the structural fire at Public Health, necessitating alternate locations for Commission meetings, as well as the Car Seat Tech training. Arrangements were able to be made for the training to be held at West Hills College Lemoore. There are 11 out of the 15 spaces filled. Commission staff will provide a brief presentation at the WIC Community Baby Shower scheduled on June 27th. Ms. Ravelo noted that this will be Dr. Lewis' last Commission meeting as the Chairperson. Commissioner Osikafo will take

over the Chairperson position at the August meeting, with Dr. Teske as Chair-elect. Ms. Ravelo also announced that Alexis has taken a position with Human Services, so this will be her last meeting as well.

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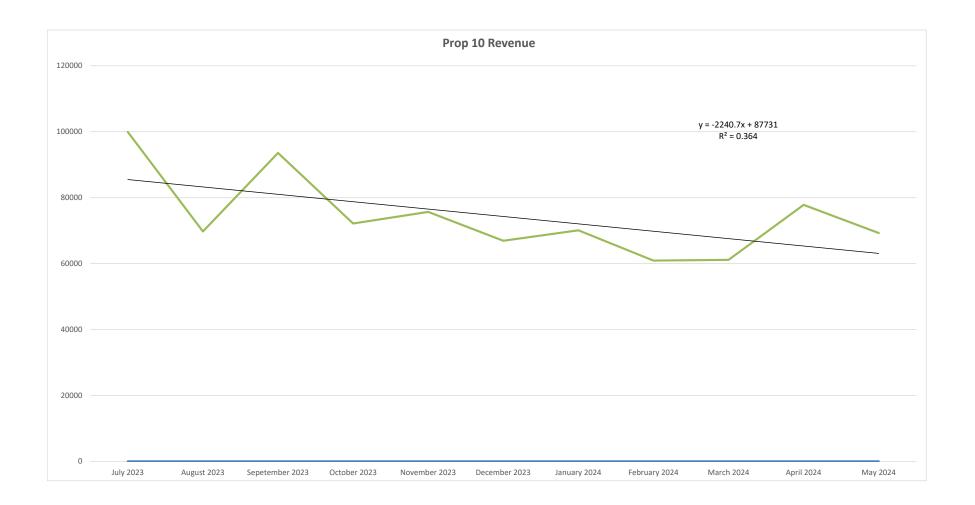

AGENDA ITEM: Review and Revision of Commission Conflict of Interest Policy

A. Background/History:

On July 1, 2024, the Commission received notice from the Deputy Clerk to the Kings County Board of Supervisors, regarding the biennial review of the Commission's Conflict of Interest Code, in accordance with the Political Reform Act.

Staff have reviewed the Commission's Conflict of Interest Code and Policy, which requires amendments related to removal of a previously deleted position (First 5 School Readiness Coordinator), and to include gender-inclusive language.

Best practice also calls for the policy to be reviewed every five years. The last time the Commission reviewed the policy was in October 2018.

B. Summary of Request, Description of Project and/or Primary Goals of Agenda Item:

Staff requests that the commission review, discuss, and consider approving the updated Conflict of Interest Policy as marked in the attached document.

C. Timeframe:

If approved the revised Conflict of Interest Policy will go into effect immediately.

D. Costs:

Conflict of Interest Policy

I. Purpose and Applicability

The statutes establishing the First 5 Children and Families Commissions provide that Commission members should include individuals providing services to children in the community. Kings County is a small rural county with few organizations providing such services. As a result, those entities that are represented on the Commission may be the same entities applying for and deserving of grants from the Commission. Therefore, conflict of interest issues arise from time to time during the Commission's proceedings.

The Political Reform Act, Government Code Sections 81000, et seq., requires state and local government agencies to adopt and promulgate Conflict of Interest Codes. The Fair Political Practices Commission has adopted a regulation, 2 Cal. Adm. Code Section 18730, which contains the terms of a standard reference, and which may be amended by the Fair Political Practices Commission to conform to amendments in the Political Reform Act after public notice and hearings. Therefore, the terms of 2 Cal. Adm. Code Section 18730 and any amendments to it duly adopted by the Fair Political Practices Commission are hereby incorporated by reference and, along with the attached Appendix "A" and Appendix "B" in which officials and employees are designated and disclosure categories are set forth, constitute the Conflict of Interest Code of the First 5 Kings County Children and Families Commission.

Conflict of Interest Protocol

The law provides that grants awarded to entities that are represented by a Commissioner are not void as long as certain steps are taken. A well-defined protocol regarding the procedure to be followed when a conflict of interest arises will eliminate uncertainty regarding the legality of these grants. Accordingly, the Commission establishes the following protocol:

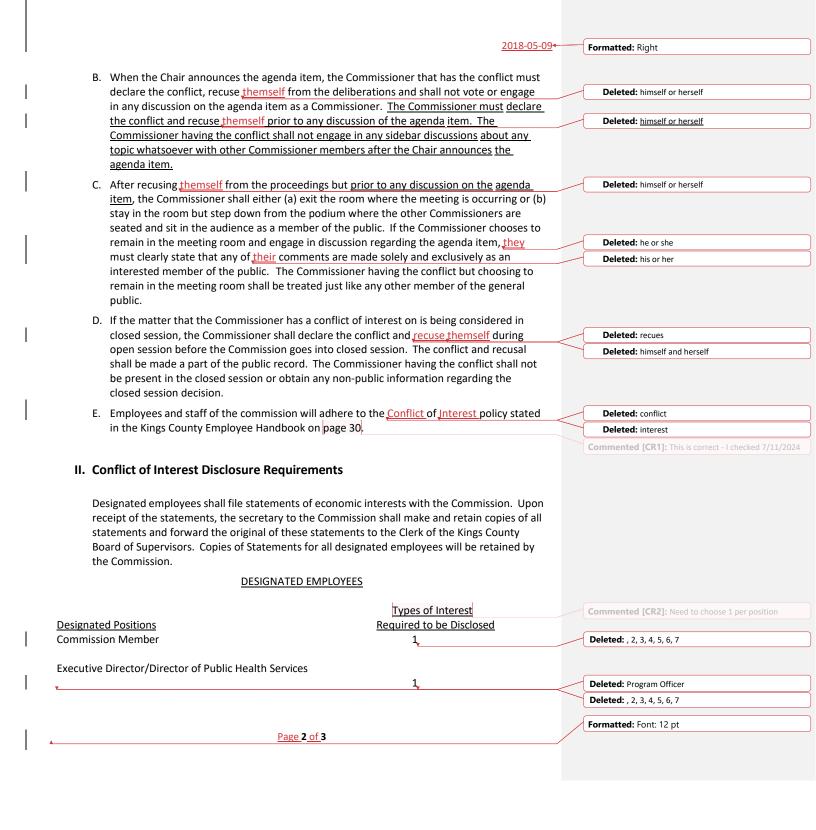
- A. The Commissioner that has a conflict of interest with regard to any subject matter before the Commission, shall refrain from addressing that matter, either privately or on the record, with any other Commissioner or staff members. The Commissioner having the conflict shall not discuss the matter with any other Commissioner or staff members prior to or during the meeting at which the matter will be discussed.
 - In order to determine whether a Commissioner has a conflict of interest, they may
 wish to consult an attorney, ask for an opinion from the Fair Political Practices
 Commission or consult County Counsel. It should be noted however that County
 Counsel represents the Commission, not the individual Commissioners. Accordingly,
 individual Commissioners do not have a reasonable expectation of confidentiality if
 they choose to consult with County Counsel about any possible conflicts.

AGENDA ITEM: May 2024 Revise Proposition 10 Revenue Projections

A. Background/History:

First 5 California releases a 5-Year County Tax Revenue Projections annually coinciding with the May Revision to the Governor's Budget. The projections also factor in assumptions provided by the Department of Finance regarding cigarette, tobacco and e-cigarette sales, as well as birthrate projections.

On April 2, 2024, the Commission approved the Fiscal Year 2024/2025 budget, in the amount of \$1,510,629, based on the annual projections released by First 5 California in July 2023.

On June 27, 2024, First 5 California released an updated 5-year Revenue Projection for FY 2024-25 through 2028-29. The projections reflect slightly higher projections compared to the July 2023 projections.

B. Summary of Request, Description of Project and/or Primary Goals of Agenda Item:

Staff is providing the projections to the Commission, to advise the Commission of potential financial impact on future Proposition 10 Revenue. Staff is requesting the Commission review and discuss the updated Five-Year projection, and potential impact of decreased revenue on future First 5-funded projects.

C. Timeframe:

The projections are for Fiscal Year 2024-25 through 2028-29.

D. Costs:

A slight increase in First 5 revenues is anticipated with the updated cigarette, tobacco and e-cigarette sales, as well as birthrates. An 111% increase is anticipated in the current Fiscal Year 2024-2025, 101% in FY 2025-2026, 108% in FY 2026-2027, and 107% in FY 2027-2028, in comparison to the July 2023 projections.

E. Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends the Commission review and discuss the potential impact of the projected revenue on future First 5-funded projects.

AGENDA ITEM: California Statewide Expansion of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library

A. Background/History:

The Dolly Parton's Imagination Library (DPIL) was initially launched in 1995 in East Tennessee, giving each child a specially selected book each month. The program has since grown nationwide, continuing the project's vision to foster a love of reading among children and families. The DPIL builds on the importance of early literacy to improve education, health, social and economic outcomes.

In June 2023, SB1183 expanded the availability of the DPIL statewide in California under the management of the California State Library. The statewide expansion includes a 50% match for each affiliate. The program is open to all children up until their 5th birthday, with a book directly mailed to the child monthly.

The Lead Local Program Partner must partner with or be a non-profit organization to receive the Bulk Postage Rate, publicize the program and facilitate program registration, fundraise and pay the monthly invoice and connect with the local post office to regularly pick up undeliverable books.

There are approximately 11,152 children under 5 in Kings County. The DPIL estimates that 65% of the total eligible children will be registered (7,248). A DPIL program in Kings County would require an investment of \$95,692 over a 3-year period, or \$172,232 over a 5-year period. These costs do not include the 50% match by the State of California.

B. Summary of Request, Description of Project and/or Primary Goals of Agenda Item:

Staff are providing information on the Statewide expansion of the DPIL to the Commission, for review and discussion.

C. Timeframe:

Not applicable.

D. Costs:

Should the Commission decide to pursue this in the future, it would cost approximately \$13.20 per child annually, or an investment of \$86,116 over a 5 year period, placing books in the hands of 7,248 children.

E. Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Commission review and discuss the information provided.

- 1. Ninety percent of physical brain development occurs in the first three years of life, when a baby forms over 1 million new neural connections per second.
- 2. When a young child enters kindergarten ready for school, there is an 82% chance that the child will master basic skills by age 11, compared with a 45% chance for children who are not school-ready.
- 3. Later in life, at-risk children who do not receive high-quality early childhood experiences are 25% more likely to drop out of school, 40% more likely to become teen parents and 60% less likely to attend college.
- 4. Investment in high-quality early childhood programs for at-risk children from birth to age five delivers a 7–10% annual return on investment through improved education, health, social and economic outcomes, increased productivity and the reduced need for social spending.

The presence of books in the home supports the child's academic, social, and emotional development. Children develop a special bond with their parents and caregivers by reading together. The Imagination Library puts books into the hands and hearts of children across the world at no cost to the family.

Challenge: Children who are read to early in life are better prepared for school. Dolly Parton's Imagination Library has been shown to significantly increase the time parents and caregivers spend reading to their children each week.

Key Stakeholders



Policymakers and Funders have significant influence in directing resources and catalyzing partnerships to adopt, scale, and take full advantage of opportunities with the Imagination Library.

Parents and Caregivers are a child's first teacher and set the course for developing their child's love of books and reading. Reading to their child from birth to age five improves their future reading ability and academic success.

Educators and Community Leaders validate the impact and continued progress as young students develop reading skills. Reducing the literacy gap in the early years allows teachers a better start in developing lifelong learners.

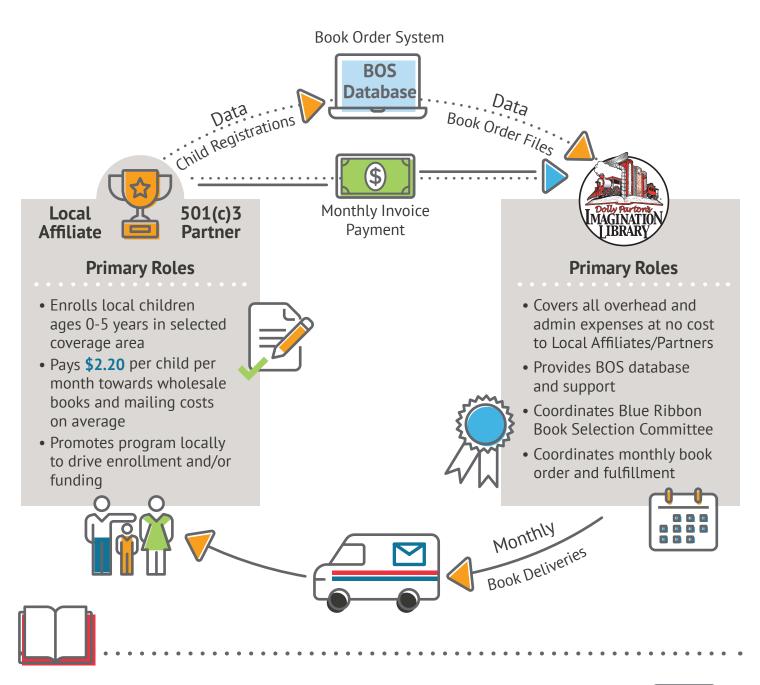

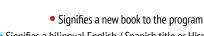
